10. What is Winton's initial attitude toward the proles? How is this shown? What makes Winston conclude that, if there is hope, it lies in the proles?

11. What is it about the paperweight that makes Winston find in it – "a whole world." Explain.

12. Explain what Winston's dreams, memories, and hallucinations indicate about his character in the beginning of the novel. Why is such mental activity a threat to

the Party? How does this mental activity work to make Winston an increasing enemy of the Party?

13. Several settings in the novel are clearly described – the apartment, the office, the lunchroom, the room over the junk shop, Room 101. Choose ONE and explain how it relates to one or two of the major themes of the novel. How does the frequent shift of scene reinforce the theme of isolation in the novel?

14. Winston's final isolation is mental, physical, and emotional. How do these aspects compare with his isolation at the beginning of the novel?

15. Discuss some of the ways suspense is created in the novel. Choose two examples of unfulfilled expectations or unexpectedly fulfilled expectations and explain why each of them is suspenseful.

16. Discuss the role in the novel of the statement 2 + 2 = 5.
